Death in the City of Light - David King 2012-06-05

Soon, despite a team of prosecuting attorneys, dozens of witnesses, and over one ton of evidence, Petiot's brilliance and wit threatened to win the day. Drawing extensively on many new sources, including the massive, classified French police file on Dr. Petiot, *Death in the City of Light* is a brilliant evocation of Nazi-Occupied Paris and a harrowing exploration of murder, betrayal, and evil of staggering proportions.

And then there was his radically modern book--so popular in the US--that visualized the themes and patterns of American Jazz (*Jazz*, 1941-47).

Flâneuse - Lauren Elkin 2017-02-28

But it is the flâneuse who captures the imagination of the cultural critic Lauren Elkin. His vivid diary account of the starvation and suffering endured by the people of Paris is published here for the first time.
